As individuals and friends, we will...

- Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas.
- Develop friendships with other children.
- Learn to use the toilet with help, and then independently.
- Develop their sense of responsibility and membership of a community.
- Select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. This helps them to achieve a goal they have chosen, or one which is suggested to them.

As communicators, we will...

- Sing a large repertoire of songs.
- Listen to simple stories and understand what is happening, with the help of the pictures.
- Understand simple questions about 'who', 'what' and 'where' (but generally not 'why').
- Start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.

As healthy movers, we will...

- Skip, hop, stand on one leg and hold a pose for a game like musical statues.
- Use large and small motor skills to do things independently, for example manage buttons and zips, and pour drinks.
- Explore different materials and tools.
- Develop their movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.
- Go up steps and stairs, or climb up apparatus, using alternate feet.
- Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.
- Use one-handed tools and equipment, for example, making snips in paper with scissors.

This term our topic is Heroes Around Us!



As readers and writers, we will...

- Have favourite books and seek them out, to share with an adult, with another child, or to look at alone.
- Repeat words and phrases from familiar stories.
- Teach children to hear the same initial sound for words and names of objects.
- Use oral blending to blend words aloud with the new sounds the children have learned

As mathematicians, we will...

- Notice patterns and arrange things in patterns.
- Develop fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually ('subitising')
- Extend and create ABAB patterns stick, leaf, stick, leaf.

As explorers and investigators,

we will...


- Explore collections of materials with similar and/or different properties.

- Show interest in different occupations.


As artists, actors and musicians,

we will...


- Use drawing to represent ideas like movement or loud noises.

- Remember and sing entire songs.














Nursery – Autumn 2 – Stories from Around the World






